


What's in it for the History Teacher?

- A fun way to introduce facts and information about different places around the world




Project I- How To Be Inside of History & Travel in 10 Easy Steps

- **Step 1- Make sure the Street View box is checked**
- **Step 2- Type in “Golden Gate Bridge” into the search box**
- **Step 3- Press Enter**
- **Step 4- You will be taken to said location**




Project 1 – Con't

- **Step 5- Under the search bar, single click on “B- Golden Gate Bridge”**
- **Step 6- An information bar should appear on your screen**
- **Step 7- Double Click on the  logo on the screen**
- **Step 8- You will be taken into a closer look of the Golden Gate Bridge**



Project 1- Con't

- **Step 9- Click on the camera logo on top of the B until a you are “in” the bridge**
- **Step 10- Click on any other camera logo to keep traveling along the bridge**



Project 2- Where Are You From? (Family History)



- This is a great project to get students to learn about their genealogy.
- Have students find out some of the places their families are from and have them Google Earth it
- After gathering information on their family's history, have them show you pictures, tell you about everyday life, and current affairs affecting the places their families are from

Project 3-The College Tour- Economic/Life Planning

- First off, type in “California State University Long Beach” in the search bar, click on the school’s name in the results window, and click on a camera
- You have just entered a place where students can gather facts about the school and get a feel for the college’s environment from the comfort of the classroom.
- Make a project of it. Have them make a presentation on their top school choices and what they learned from the virtual college tour experience.


Project 4- World Travels in the Middle of a Lesson

- World History teachers will enjoy the benefits of taking students to places online in the middle of reading about it.
- Reading about China? Type in “Beijing, China” and you’ll get access to tons of great satellite pictures and information.
- Google Earth has partnered up with Wikipedia to provide students with instant information on the places they are searching worldwide.




Project 5- Politics, U.S. History and More Research

- For the U.S. Government of American History teacher, Google Earth allows students to visit historic landmarks.
- In addition, if students need to further their research beyond using this software, Google Earth will provide students with links to further their exploration.





Project 6- Geography

- Have student get a feel for elevations, coast lines, sea level, and weather by having them explore various locations.
- Google Earth provides a geographical map so they can look at one specific area, and also provides a world map, so they can see where that one area is located. Both can be used at once. (Go to View-> Overlay Map)



Project 7- Incorporating Video

- Google Earth has also teamed up with the Discovery Channel to bring videos to users of different places from around the world. (i.e. Rome, Italy)
